





Context

Strengthening Auditing and Reporting in the Countries of the Eastern Partnership (STAREP) is a regional program of the Centre for Financial Reporting Reform (CFRR).

The program aims to create a transparent policy environment and effective institutional framework for corporate reporting within the countries that make up the European Union's Eastern Partnership: Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Georgia, Moldova and Ukraine.

Members of the STAREP Accounting and Auditing Education Community of Practice (EduCoP) are working together to identify common solutions for strengthening accounting education.

The accounting education change debate is not new. The purpose of this session is twofold: (i) to examine the case for change by reviewing the common criticisms of accounting education put forward over the past 30 years; and (ii) to explore the factors which are driving the reform agenda and which are likely to shape accounting education in the future. The drivers underlying the need for changes in accounting education are codified in the International Education Standards (IES). Using these standards as a framework can help organizations move forward systematically in pursuing best practices and meeting EU regulations. The speaker will provide the audience with an overview of the IES and will provide examples of a range of practices used to meet the various standards.
